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
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


A LIVING HOPE INTRODUCTION

A PROMISED
HOPE

Titus 1:1-2

“Paul, a servant of God and an apostle of Jesus Christ to further the faith of God’s elect and their knowledge of the truth that leads to godliness — in the hope of eternal life, which God, who does not lie, promised before the beginning of time ...”

A promise is only as trustworthy as the one who makes the promise. This is not a uniquely Christian concept; rather, it is one that we encounter when making most big life decisions.

Whether you are taking out a student loan, renting an apartment, or making a big purchase such as a car or a house, it is common practice for the other party to request your credit score. The person you are doing business with wants to know your history of keeping promises and paying in full. How much more necessary for us as believers to understand the trustworthiness of the God who promises eternal life!

As with most relationships, trust is built over time. Thankfully, when it comes to God, he has no shortage of time. When our hearts begin to question the promises of God, we can look to Scripture and be reminded of the promise child with whom God blessed Abraham and Sarah, the promises of victory against enemies as the Israelites went to war, and the promise of a coming Messiah sprinkled throughout the Old Testament and carried out in the New Testament.

Furthermore, we can cling to the promises made to us in Scripture: the promise of a future and hope, the promise to never be alone and the promise that all things work together for good. We see these promises on the pages of our Bible, but when we experience them, they come to life in our own stories, and we are reminded that our God keeps his promises.



INSPIRES ENDURANCE

1 Thessalonians 1:3

“We remember before our God and Father your work produced by faith, your labor prompted by love, and your endurance inspired by hope in our Lord Jesus Christ.”

Keep going. Don't give up. Endure.

Maybe you've spent time training for a marathon or prepping for a big exam. Maybe you've faced a hard season and had to push through, despite not knowing if or when it would end. Maybe you've heard someone say these things to you: Just keep going. One more step. Don't give up. Endure.

Easier said than done, right?

It's our natural inclination to try to get by on our own – to conquer things with our own strength and our own physical, mental and emotional capabilities. But when we do this, we run into a problem. When we're pushing through and fighting to endure on our own strength and desires alone, we will fail. If the only thing we can hope in – the only thing we look to for inspiration to endure – is ourselves, we lose faith.

Hope is a powerful thing, so where are you placing it? When hope is fully realized in the knowledge of who God is, what he's done and how he loves us, it's as powerful as it can possibly be. Powerful enough to inspire endurance. 1 Thessalonians 1:3 reminds us of this truth. Hope is what we can cling to and rely on when we face that giant mountain that seems impossible to climb on our own. Hope that God is with us, that he is for us and that his strength through the power of his spirit is what overcomes, is the ultimate source of inspiration when it comes to enduring. Hope in Christ – not in ourselves – is what should encourage us to keep fighting the good fight and keeping the faith.


We are not alone. We are not blindly enduring. We are taking that one more step, not giving up, and are moving forward because of where we have placed our hope.

IS OUR INHERITANCE

Ephesians 1:18

“I pray that the eyes of your heart may be enlightened in order that you may know the hope to which he has called you, the riches of his glorious inheritance in his holy people.”

When Paul wrote those words, he was addressing Christians in Ephesus, but his words were as impactful to them then as they are to us today.

As believers in his gospel and by his sacrifice, we are reconciled into a kinship with God from which we were once hopelessly separated. We are his children, and as his children, we find ourselves heirs to a kingdom we could never have hoped to receive by our own merit. It's an estate only the Lord himself could craft and freely give by his grace — one of wisdom and love, of profound communion with God, and one that grants us an inheritance few will know completely: hope.

Where we were once blinded by the earthly confines of this life, our eyes have now been opened to enduring life with God. We know that this is not our home, that we belong with Christ in eternity, that we are made to reflect the Lord in all our wanderings here on earth until he calls us home. Our story does not end here. While we toil in shadows that will someday cease and the world will pass away, we are called to a light that will never be extinguished. [And more than that, we know that the very strength that sustains us is of the same God and by the same God who resurrected Christ from the dead and seated him at his right hand. Think about that!



HOPE
BRINGS STRENGTH

Isaiah 40:31

“Those who hope in the LORD will renew their strength.
They will soar on wings like eagles; they will run and not
grow weary, they will walk and not be faint.”

A quick internet search of the Merriam-Webster dictionary provides three main definitions for the word **strength**:

STRENGTH

(noun)

1. the quality or state of being strong; capacity for exertion or endurance
2. power to resist force
3. power of resisting attack

Each of these definitions leads us to think that strength has everything to do with our physical state. To be strong, we must put in the daily work of going to the gym to lift weights or do a cardio workout so we can endure, resist or restrain. Without this daily diligence in building strength, we will lose muscle or a physical battle against someone stronger. While physical strength training is certainly important, this view of strength leads us to rely on ourselves. It's a continual striving that we do on our own; it leaves God out of the picture.

Isaiah 40:31 points us to a different kind of strength, a spiritual strength that can come only from the daily practice of putting our hope in the Lord. It's a strength that comes when we cease striving through our own efforts. It's a strength that comes when we surrender to the Lord of Life and trust that his strength will be our renewal.

When we put our hope in the Lord daily, we are strong in him (which is so much better than our own strength). When we hope in the Lord daily, we can endure persecution, suffering, sickness and grief because we know God has a perfect purpose and plan. Putting our hope in the Lord gives us power to resist forces of evil and to resist the attacks of the Evil One himself.

So, at our next gym workout, let us be reminded to practice hoping in the Lord. We can build physical strength while building spiritual strength. When we do this, we will not grow weary. We will not grow faint. We will be able to endure, resist and fight every spiritual battle that comes our way because we rest in the strength of God himself.



TRUSTING THE GOD OF
HOPE

Romans 15:13

"May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace as you trust in him, so that you may overflow with hope by the power of the Holy Spirit."

Hope is a concept that is incredibly interesting to ponder. It is not a tangible object that can be plainly seen. Nor is it an article that one can physically pack up and carry with her wherever she goes. Because hope may not be something that individuals feel or think they interact with on a daily basis, it is easy for its influence to go unnoticed and its value to be ignored. But if ever someone experiences the absence of hope, the pain she will find is devastatingly palpable.

About six months ago I experienced the loss of my father. He was a God-fearing man who dedicated his life to serving the Lord and raised me to do the same. I have always believed in the Scriptures and the promises God made, but in this time, I found myself heartbroken and terrified. For days my mind was spinning and flooded with doubt and questioning. What if we got it wrong? What if there is no God and there is nothing that comes after this life? What if that really was the last time I will ever see my dad? On top of the immense grief I felt for the loss of my father I started to feel a hopelessness that comes without the promise of new life. I cried out to the Lord daily and hourly, "I believe, I believe, God help my disbelief" (Mark 9).


In my pain, my only comfort was Scripture and specifically the passages that reiterated God's promise. I read them over and over as I came to find they are my only hope, the hope I must cling to and the hope I believe my dad abounded in. I praise the Lord that he is a God of hope and that we, his children, can find hope in the life, death and resurrection of the Lord, Jesus Christ. Even in my sadness the past few months, I have found a joy and peace that surpasses all understanding, one that can come only through believing in the Messiah.



God of hope, I pray that no matter the circumstance, we as your children would turn to you so that we do not experience hopelessness. Instead, may you fill us with all joy and peace, and by the power of the Holy Spirit, may we abound in hope. Amen.

I gave up my life on the cross and bore your sin because I want you near me for all eternity. I have paid your debt, and it is finished.



Is the God to whom I pray.


The God who stills the tempest

1 Peter 1:3

“Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! In his great mercy he has given us new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead.”

Hope. It is the one thing that we humans cannot live without. When hope dies within us, many simply give up or allow their souls to become numb or bitter. Hope is what gives us strength not only to exist but also to flourish in life. It is the promise that there is something better on the horizon, something worth all the effort in our daily struggles.

But hope is not wishful thinking or sheer willpower to push through challenging times. It is completely dependent upon the object of our hope. For the Christian, hope is not based on anything material; nor is it an emotion or an expectation. Rather, it is a person – Jesus Christ, our living hope.

And “living” is the amazing key to our hope. Because of the resurrection of Jesus Christ, everything has changed. His defeat of death has made possible a new life that he offers to all who put their trust in him. Gone is the striving to do enough good deeds to outweigh our sin. The reality is that we are dead in our sin without Jesus.

But God in his mercy came up with a plan to reconcile us to himself. When we choose to follow Jesus and trust that his sacrifice is complete payment for our sin, the Father who raised Jesus from the dead promises also to raise us to new life. We, too, are born into this living hope.

Many things in our lives are beyond our control, but the one thing we do have control over is our attitude toward our life and circumstances. God calls us to join him in embracing his perspective by living with eternity in mind – an eternity that affects our present and future. Because of Jesus’ resurrection, the Spirit of God lives inside you, Jesus intercedes for you and he is preparing a place for you in heaven. Jesus offers a hope that no person or circumstance can take away! In Christ, we can persevere, find our strength in him and have a joy-filled, hopeful spirit.

Would you join me in living a life of praise to God, a life whose focus keeps our eyes and heart on Jesus Christ, our living hope?


